- Do you think this spoon was used for everyday tasks or for special events? What makes you think that?
- Take a minute to observe the handle of the spoon. Do you notice the bird on top?
- On the island of Timor, the indigenous peoples believe their ancestors take the form of great birds. If you were to make an object that represents your family, what would you create? Would you include an animal?

- Inspect the bead work. Can you make out any faces or human forms?
- Compare this object to another one you have seen on this tour. How are they similar and different? Consider line, color, shape, medium, and texture as you compare and contrast the two objects.
- Would you design something this ornate for an everyday task, like carrying a child? Why or why not?
- This artwork was created with materials that the artist found in their local community. If you were to create an artwork that represented your home, what materials would you use?

Yoke

- Art historians cannot agree on what function this yoke might have served in ancient Mayan life. Yokes are large rounded bars, usually used to fasten animals to carts and farm equipment. However, some think this piece was used for a Mesoamerican ball game. What function do you think it might have served in the game? Could it have been the goal? Was it a belt the players wore?
- On a piece of paper, sketch the different lines and shapes you see. What tools did the artist use to create these designs?
- This artwork is made out of stone. What textures do you imagine you would feel if you could touch this artwork?
 Do you think that it's heavy or light? Why do you think it's made out of stone instead of a different material?
- If you created a game or sport around this artwork, how would someone play it? Would it be a team or solo sport? What are the rules?



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Post Tour Art-making Activity

WHAT YOU NEED:

INSTRUCTIONS:

In this art activity, you will redesign an object of your choice.

- 1. Look around you and pick an object you'd like to redesign (ex. pen, chair, window, etc.)

- How will your new object function?
- Will it be the same or different?
- How can you balance function with creativity in your redesign?
