The world is full of art! If you look at things creatively, you will see that art is everywhere.


Scrap Paper Mash-up



For this activity you will need:

- one sheet white paper
- scrap paper (colored paper, mail, magazine page, etc.)
- pencil
- glue (optional)
- objects you find outside, around the classroom, or house (optional)

Scrap Paper Mash-up



- Rip up a piece of scrap paper into random shapes and sizes.
- Glue the scrap paper onto the sheet of white paper however you want.
- *If you don't have glue, trace or outline the torn-paper shapes onto your paper.
- You can add other materials to your paper or trace shapes of things you find inside or outside!

- Have you ever looked up at the clouds and seen different shapes or pictures?
- Imagine the shapes on your paper are taking new forms! How many different things do you see?
- Draw details to turn your shapes into something new. For a challenge, set a timer for 5-minutes!
