

### **Docent/Teacher-led Museum Tours**

Students who participate in both docent- and teacher-led K-12 Museum Tours, benefit from direct encounters with the numerous works of art within UMFA's permanent collection. This includes works on view from around the world as well as traveling exhibitions.

- Students and teachers engage with 6,000 years of human creativity through the UMFA's permanent collection as well as traveling exhibitions.
- Participating classrooms are sent a pre-lesson plan to prepare for their visit and introduce themes for their tour and museum manners.
- Gallery tours are generally an hour in length and consist of engaging hands-on, object-centered, inquiry-based experiences.
- UMFA docents (gallery teachers) act as facilitators as they employ current educational pedagogies, age-appropriate teaching strategies, discussion questions, and handson activities to create meaningful experiences with the works of art. This year, 61 docents contributed 1,825 hours to support these tours.
- Students benefit from small group sizes, averaging 5-7 per group, and individual attention.





- Each tour is specially customized to the needs and learning objectives of the group, emphasizing interaction and respectful, open dialogue.
- Most tour visits are followed by a 30-minute artmaking workshop in UMFA's classroom to help
  students solidify the themes presented on the
  tour and establish meaningful connections to
  the artwork. During the fall semester, students
  decorated leather bracelets with a pattern
  of symbols representing their identity. In the
  winter semester, students created pictures
  of belonging using their hands as inspiration
  and learning a drawing technique that makes
  shapes look three-dimensional.

#### **Tour Themes**

- UMFA Special Exhibitions and Highlights (K-12): Utilizing our global, diverse collection and temporary exhibitions, this guided tour highlights notable artworks through conversation, questions, and engaging activities
- How to Look at a Work of Art (K-12): Train your artistic eye and develop visual literacy as we practice looking closely at details to interpret works of art using visual evidence. Our world is full of images and it is important that we can read them, discover their meaning, and examine why artists make the choices they

- do. We will discover how to look at a work of art through sketching, storytelling, and games, asking questions about what we see, and making looking at art fun!
- Storytelling (3-5): Come explore a world full
  of stories at UMFA! Students will experience
  different types of stories and storytelling methods
  from around the world to look at and discuss
  art. Students will learn about visual narrative
  to uncover clues and details hidden in works
  of art that reveal secrets, mysteries, facts, and
  questions. Thanks to our friends at the UofU Book
  Arts Program, each participant will make a comic
  book and create their own incredible story!

### **PARTners**

The pARTners program brings every fourth-grade student in Salt Lake City School District to the UMFA. Tours explore creativity in our world through hands-on, engaging experiences that connect the Museum's global collection to Utah Core Standards and students' personal experiences. As one of UMFA's longest-running programs, the goal of pARTners is to provide valuable arts learning experiences that foster visual literacy, creativity, critical thinking, and effective communication.

# Creative Leaps: Inspiration from Contemporary Art and Dance Tour

Students joined Ririe Woodbury Dance Company and the Utah Museum of Fine Arts to dance, doodle, and discover the dynamic world of contemporary art and dance! This special program was held in person at the UMFA on December 5–7, 2023 and February 6–8,

2024 and guided students on a diverse journey to react and respond to amazing works of performing and visual art. The program included a guided tour, art and movement workshops, and a performance by Ririe Woodbury Dance Company.

#### **Dual Tours: UMFA and NHMU**

Students were invited to explore two museums in one day with this exciting adventure of art and culture! Students practiced critical thinking skills and discovered cultural connections through art and artifact discoveries at the UMFA and NHMU!

### **Virtual Visits**

This program uses video conferencing technology for real-time art tours of UMFA's galleries, no matter the class's distance from the museum. It was developed to provide students with a virtual experience of walking in the galleries and engaging with a

selection of artworks on view. UMFA educators developed five tour themes, as detailed below, and accept special requests from teachers. Each theme connects to state core standards and emphasizes question-based, experiential learning. A unique preand post-lesson was developed for each theme and included various art-making activities.

- Amplifying Voices: Students learn about the power of art to amplify their voices while engaging with the Create, Respond, and Connect Visual Arts strands. This fall the presentation included artworks from special exhibition Space Maker.
- Art History Classroom Connections: The UMFA
  is an ideal location for students and teachers
  of history and art history. Through our global
  collection, students can engage with more than
  5,000 years of human creativity and specify a
  focus or theme (Geographic Area, AP Content
  Unit, etc.).



 Artwork Deep Dive: For a short 20–30-minute experience, these classes dive deep into art, build 21st-century skills by thoroughly examining a specific artwork, and help students learn how to critique and understand through the practice of close looking.

# STEM Community Alliance Program (STEMCAP): Mission STEMCAP

UMFA is proud to partner with STEMCAP (STEM Community Action Program) to provide art and science workshops and virtual art museum tours to Youth-in-Custody (YIC). Goals of the partnership are to: 1) Inspire creativity, curiosity, and critical thinking to help students understand how art, like science, can communicate holistic and multi-faceted narratives, and 2) highlight the role of multi-disciplinary communication in understanding other perspectives that uplifts community and foster collaborative efforts in the face of collective problems.

This organization is within the University of Utah School of Biological Sciences and has relationships with five YIC facilities throughout the Wasatch Front. Mission STEMCAP is a five-part programming series over two weeks that explores one of the five environmental "Grand Challenges": biodiversity loss, pollution, overconsumption, extinction, and climate disruption. The "mission" is to help students learn about, respond to, and teach others about their assigned grand challenge through multiple workshops, activities and lectures while demonstrating to students the ways that they can tackle grand challenges in their own lives. This year, UMFA educators developed virtual tours about pollution, climate change, and overconsumption for this special program.

### Museum in the Classroom

Through this program, UMFA educators deliver onsite classroom art education that includes authentic art objects, hands-on experiences, and art-making activities. Museum in the Classroom (MIC) delivers important art education experiences across the state—from one-room schoolhouses to metropolitan campuses— providing a K–12 curriculum that supports in-classroom learning and introduces new concepts and techniques. All presentations and activities align with Utah Core Standards and can be adapted to any grade level.

- During these engaging presentations, students examine authentic art objects from around the world while educators facilitate thematic conversations that encourage diverse, global perspectives. (Strand: Respond)
- The art objects foster discovery as students identify their own stories and make personal connections to the cultures represented. (Strand: Connect)
- Presentations include age-appropriate and relevant art-making activities. (Strand: Create)

The following presentations are offered as part of the current MIC program, though we also take special requests:

- Connecting Utah's Past and Present: Develop an appreciation and awareness of the art that shapes our state's history and informs our future by examining works from various Utah cultures. During the in-class presentation, students will use critical thinking skills, hands-on object handling, and art-making to make discoveries and connections. This presentation is most connected to 4th and 7th grade learning but can be adapted for any grade level.
- Our World Past Traditions/New Voices: Explore how art tells the story of our world's past, present, and future. During the in-class presentation, students will use critical thinking skills, handson object handling, and art-making to discover similarities and differences between world cultures and find connections to their own cultures and traditions. This presentation is most connected to 3rd and 6th grade learning but can be adapted for any grade level.

- Printmaking: Discover the fascinating process of printmaking in your classroom! We have three different themes developed for specific grades, though all are adaptable to any grade level:
- Storytelling through Japanese Prints (K-3rd): Engage in ideas of storytelling with Japanese prints before students create their own visual story with Gyotaku Fish Prints.
- Abstract Printmaking (4-6th): Explore two abstract print artworks, focusing on shapes and lines before creating their own abstract relief prints.
- Exploring Traditions with Mexican Prints
   (7–12th): Look at four prints from Mexico, two
   historic and two contemporary to explore how
   traditions and culture influence our current lives.
   Students are then invited to create a print design
   answering the question: How do you see the role
   of your culture and traditions in your life?
- Photography: Develop your visual literacy by focusing on select Elements of Art and Principles of Design. Students will examine authentic photographs, identifying and using

- the vocabulary of the Elements and Principles to talk about art. Students will then using Polaroid cameras to take their own photographs. This presentation can be adapted to any grade level.
- Land Art in Utah: From the comfort of their classroom, this presentation will transport students to Utah's most important land artworks, Robert Smithson's Spiral Jetty and Nancy Holt's Sun Tunnels. Students will explore themes in these artworks with hands-on activities which can be adapted to any grade level.

### **Art Sprinkles**

In the first year for this program, we worked with Channing Hall charter school's Kindergarten classes. We visited these classes once a month with artworks from the UMFA's education collection, building a connection for the kindergarteners with the museum. Each session was 30 minutes of close looking and activities. Themes ranged from Elements of Art and Social Emotional Learning to







Symbolism and Storytelling. In the Spring, for their March session, the classes toured the museum with the theme "Art and What We Eat." The teachers excitedly asked to continue the program next year.

### **Pen Pals Workshops**

In this special program, students from a selected school in a focus district explore themes presented within a UMFA special exhibition though multiple sessions. This spring we worked with Union High School around exhibit Pictures of Belonging on view from February 24 to June 30, 2024. Each session included guided art discussions and artmaking. The first session students were introduced to Pictures of Belonging with the theme "Faces and Communities" in mind. They then created a mini artwork that expressed their identity that was shared with a pen pal. pen pals were anonymously assigned among all the art classes in the school. The second session looked at artworks with the theme of "Belongings and (dis)locations", they were encouraged to be mindful and think of the things to be grateful for while creating an artistic thank you card for their pen pal. The final session analyzed artworks with the theme of "Explorations and Rediscoveries, they created an artwork for themselves while exploring different mediums.

## **STEMCAP Artmaking Workshops**

In addition to virtual tours, we also provided artmaking workshops with STEMCAP for Youth-in-Custody (YIC) schools in the centers. We Are Water was one particular project that we helped with facilitating the portrait making sessions and artist statement. In this project students learned about the Great Salt Lake and the different rivers that feed into it, while creating a self-portrait that has a section of a selected river. Along with our Mission



STEMCAP virtual presentations we also occasionally provided artmaking workshops along the same topic where students created artwork. Projects included photography, upcycling materials (specifically LaserDiscs), and painting porcelain bowls. All of these workshops took place in the schools' classrooms and are hands-on to allow students to express scientific ideas through creative outlets.

#### **Events**

## Evening for Educators: Symbols of Family | Hybrid event | October 25, 2023 | 5–8 pm

Educators were invited to explore the UMFA's collections and special exhibition *Tatau: Marks of Polynesia* to dive deeper into understanding the varied symbols of family. Families come in many forms and can be biological and/or chosen. Understand students better by understanding their situations and how they thrive in a family, while making your classroom its own sort of family. This evening included community members sharing their personal connections to *Tatau: Marks of Polynesia* before participants spent time finding their own art connections. We finished the night with a special hands-on activity led by Esmeralda Torres, introducing us to the wonderful world of cacao and her heritage from Chiapas, México.

Following this event, UMFA distributed a digital file containing lesson plans and additional readings and resources. Through attendance at this event and completion of a survey, teachers received three relicensure points. If teachers attended all five

evening sessions (a total of 15 hours) and completed a field test, they received one semester credit. Preservice teachers from Utah schools often attend these programs to enrich their preparations for classroom teaching.

#### Haruko Obata: A Life of Flowers

The UMFA was proud to host Kimi Hill to discuss the life and art of her grandmother, the pioneering Bay Area issei ikebana sensei (teacher), Haruko Obata (1892–1989). Based on a 1986 oral history, we explored Haruko's youth in Japan, her life as the wife of artist Chiura Obata and mother of four children, her forced incarceration at Topaz, and her long career as an artist in her own right. K-12 teachers received relicensure hours by filling out a worksheet while attending the hour-long presentation, finding a coordinating artwork that could be used in classroom activities, and participating in a group discussion.

#### **Land Art STEAM Campout**

For this special professional development event, a select group of educators joined us embracing land art and the integrations of STEAM (Science,





Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math). Utah is home to two extraordinary land artworks and we explored their cross curricular connections in a two-day event. Educators applied to be a part of the selected cohort.

On June 24th, the group traveled to Nancy Holt's *Sun Tunnels* to learn and explore through hands-on activities and academic experiences before camping overnight. On June 25th, the group drove to Robert Smithson's *Spiral Jetty* to continue the learning and activities. The entire event started at the UMFA at 11:00am on the 24th and ended around 7:00pm on the 25th.

#### Resources

#### **Classroom Posters**

With this resource, teachers can decorate their classrooms with posters of artworks from the UMFA. On the back of each poster includes basic background info about the artwork and two simple activities (one for elementary and one for secondary) that engage with the work. These posters were available at various educator programs and on our website. The posters are of a *Chinese Funerary Urn*, a *Necklace with Double Bat Effigies* from Panama, a *Flower Still Life* by Flemish artist Francois Ykens, *Infinity Nets* by Yayoi Kusama, *Hot Dog Bridge* by Russell Talbert Gordon, and *Forest Seed Basket* for present and future understanding by Merritt Johnson.

#### **Materials Refills**

Teachers can refresh their UMFA printmaking materials each year by requesting and receiving a kit of supplies to continue teaching the artform in their classroom. Material refills are just one-way UMFA ensures that arts teaching and learning is continued and sustainable in the classroom long after our time in the classroom comes to an end.


## **Digital Resources**

## **Creative Leaps: Inspirations from Contemporary Art and Dance** (https://umfa.utah.edu/creative-leaps)

Collaboration with Ririe-Woodbury Dance Company

During this collaboration with fellow POPS organization Ririe-Woodbury Dance Company, we created a digital opportunity for teachers and K-6 students to discover the dynamic world of contemporary art and dance! This program includes a thirty-minute film, with ASL and Spanish interpretation, pre- and post-film lessons, and a resource of additional information about the artists and artworks. K-12 teachers are given free access to the film by filling out a simple form gathering basic school and class information.

In this film we explore five artworks: Series III
Spectrum Squared, Variation A and J by Anna
Campbell Bliss, Periphery by Lynette Yiadom-Boakye,
Twilight Galaxies by Ezra Wube, Discarded Memories
by Chakaia Booker, and Fuerza del Amor by Roots Art

Kollective. These artworks are paired with dances choreographed and performed by Ririe-Woodbury within the museum galleries. As this video is very interactive, including both movement and visual artmaking throughout, students are encouraged to have pencil, paper, and a surface to draw on, as well as plenty of space for movement at the ready. Through an exploration of storytelling, elements, and the similarities and differences between art forms, students are empowered to creatively and actively express their own ideas and feelings about the world around them and learn that sources of inspiration can be found anywhere.

#### "On the Wall" Educator Newsletter

Our quarterly newsletter updates educators on opportunities and resources available from the UMFA. There are 659 emails currently receiving On the Wall. This newsletter is key to communicating with educators and sharing digital resources and programs. As each newsletter now has a highlighted artwork, there is also a new Community Response section about the work. Thus far these responses have ranged from UMFA docents, Utah educators, and students! The community members are paid for a 70-100 word response that touches on a personal or teaching connection.
